To be honest, I don't know that we really need another book--yet another book--on guidance and the will of God. Having said that, there is probably no genre of book I recommend more often than this simply because experience shows that many Christians, too many Christians, do not understand how God expects us to know his will and how we may expect him to guide us to those things that please him. We are blessed to have some excellent resources at our disposal. The best known of these is Garry Friesen's Decision Making and the Will of God, a book that many of the others depend on, but one that is perhaps a little intimidating due to its size (528 pages in the most recent edition). Dave Swavely's Decisions, Decisions is the one I recommend most often as it

serves as a useful condensed version of Friesen's work. Similar titles have been written by John MacArthur, Bruce Waltke, J.I. Packer, Phillip Jensen and many, many others. The author who seeks to add something to this genre is entering into a very crowded field and is going to need a unique angle. Kevin DeYoung takes on this challenge and succeeds admirably, crafting a short but powerful book that really packs a punch. His unique angle is reflected in the title: Just Do Something! "My goal," he says, "is not as much to tell you how to hear God's voice in making decisions as it is to hear God telling you to get off the long road to nowhere and finally make a decision, get a job, and perhaps, get married." He fears that many Christians, because of their unbliblical understanding of knowing and doing the will of God, are wasting their lives doing nothing when they should just be doing, well, something!

When I was in my teens I read a great book (still in print) called Decision Making and the Will of God by Gary Friesen and Robin Maxon. It was a watershed book for me in helping me with how to make wise decisions. Over the years I've recommended the book to many who have who have sought my counsel on the guestion "How can I know the will of God for my life?". The problem with the book by Friesen and Maxon is it's length (It was based on Friesen's doctoral dissertation at Dallas Theological Seminary). It's a great book, but it's length is prohibitive for many. Here's the distinct advantage of DeYoung's book - essentially the same principles and content - in 300 pages less!DeYoung focuses on the facts of what God has revealed in the Scriptures so that we can best discern wisely what he wants from us. He makes a good case that God never intends for us to know "specifically" what He wants us to do (vocation), where He wants us to live, or who to marry (among many other questions we ask); however, DeYoung shows what God wants us to be like (Jesus) and how this purpose (sanctification) informs our decision-making. In the final analysis DeYoung writes: "Live for God. Obey the Scriptures. Think of others before yourself. Be holy. Love Jesus. And as you do these things, do whatever else you like, with whomever you like, and you'll be walking in the will of God...the will of God for your life is pretty straightforward: Be holy like Jesus, by the power of the Spirit, for the glory of God."The author does a wonderful job of using practical illustrations to show how we worry, procrastinate, and flat-out sin by not doing what we know to do, as we put out fleeces, wait for signs, and pray as we wait for God's discernment.

So, I recently finished Kevin DeYoungâ ™s book â œJust Do Something: A Liberating Approach to Finding Godâ ™s Will OR How to Make A Decision Without Dream, Visions, Fleeces, Impressions, Open Doors, Random Bible Verses, Casting Lots, Liver Shivers, Writing In The Sky, Etc.â •.The title

alone has itâ TMs own paragraph in my post, but I can assure you that this little book is a quick read. and most people simply refer to the title as a ceJust Do Somethinga •. This review I am writing is on behalf of Moody Publishers, who provided me a copy of the book and the permission to post a review of it. So here goes: Quite honestly, I found this book to be a liberating counterbalance to the hyper-cautious and fearful notion that our day-to-day decisions can screw up Godâ ™s plan for our lives. I teach Sunday School at my neighborhood church, and I also am a pretty new Christian (4) years), so I definitely understand the desire to hit the preverbal nail on the head of Godâ ™s willâ " Itâ ™s a desire that lâ ™ve found many very â œgreenâ • or young Christians have. So I am fond of DeYoungâ ™s description of Godâ ™s will as more of a circle outlined by scripture, as opposed to a single solitary dot on a massive span of sinful white space. His point is clear: Scripture can point us to universal truths that will help us live within the sphere of Godâ ™s Will. We donâ ™t have to wait for a giant sign in the sky to go ahead and apply for a job or declare a major in college. I get that. But while I found this book refreshing and liberating, I couldnâ ™t help but be disheartened and uncomfortable with DeYoungâ ™s downplay of the role that the Holy Spirit has in our lives. One of the bookâ ™s key points (itâ ™s stated over and over again, rather redundantly) is that moral decisions matter much more than non-moral ones.
